What courses are on offer at

CDC? German Intensive Courses are held at the Carl Duisberg Centren in Berlin, Cologne, Dortmund, Munich, Radolfzell and Saarbrücken. There are two kinds:

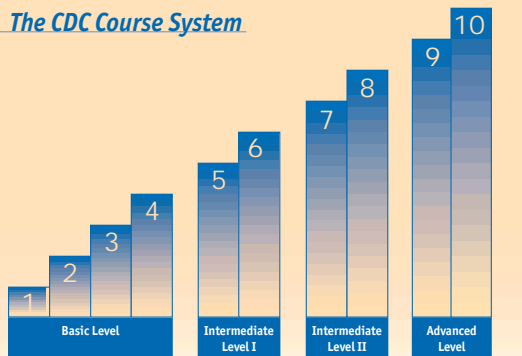
Intensive Course The Intensive Course has 24 group training units (TU)* a week in every centre. In this course you will learn in a systematic way and according to the CDC course system. Before the course starts, we'll give you a test to determine how good your German already is and then place you in a group of students all at your level.

If you have no previous knowledge of German, then you'll start the course in the beginners group. Students at basic level will work mainly with a textbook. Those at the intermediate or advanced level will increasingly work with free materials (from newspapers, magazines, etc.). In the Intensive Course, grammar and vocabulary are explained and practised; listening and reading are also focused on as well as speaking and writing. The goal of every lesson is to enable you to use German in your job, studies or private life.



Intensive Course Plus The Intensive Course Plus has – on top of the 24 group TU – a total of six more supervised TU per week where you learn by yourself. Your teachers will give you tips on how you can make best use of the modern media centre at the Carl Duisberg Centren to ensure that your learning is successful. If you'd like to practise your grammar, consolidate your reading or spelling skills or work on special topics, then you can also use the interactive multi-media learning programmes on the computer or the comprehensively equipped library and video library. CDC tutors will be happy to give you advice on all this.

The CDC Course System



Active Language

Course As a young person or young adult over the age of 16, you'll find our Active Language Course from June to August at the CDC Centre in Radolfzell the ideal combination of an intensive

German course with 24 TU and an attractive holiday and leisure programme on three afternoons a week as well as on Saturdays. Besides this, you can also book sporting activities such as tennis, horse-riding, sailing or fitness courses.



One-to-one Tuition/Small Groups/Specialist Language Courses All eight CDC centres offer one-to-one tuition and lessons in small groups of up to 5 people. This form of training course is especially recommended if you want to improve your existing knowledge of the German language in a targeted way in a short space of time or if you want, for example, to prepare for a presentation or a trade fair. When you're in a small group or taking one-to-one tuition, then your needs and wishes as regards specialist language – in the field of business or technology for example – can be focused on. At the CDC centres in Berlin, Dortmund, Cologne, Munich, Radolfzell and Saarbrücken, you can also combine a Group Intensive Course with some TU of one-to-one tuition in order to make best use of the advantages of the two forms of learning.

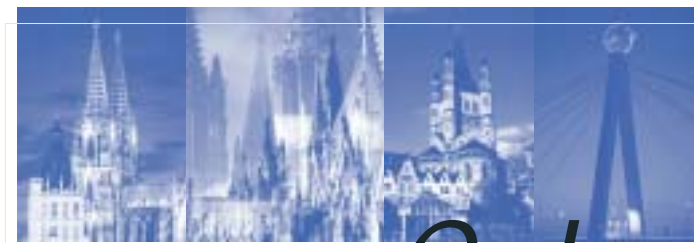

Cologne

... that the open and friendly inhabitants of Cologne, the mecca for music and carnival fans and culture freaks, leave their mark on the town. Germany's media and conference centre has something for every taste: whether it's a stroll along the Rhine, a film premiere or a cosy beer garden - life pulsates around the world-famous Cologne Cathedral.

The metropolis on the Rhine can look back on over 2,000 years of history since its foundation by the Romans, and today it is one of Germany's cultural and economic centres. You'll come across many well-preserved remains dating back to Roman times as well as the world-famous Gothic cathedral, important museums and galleries as well as a diverse theatre scene. A variety of pubs, restaurants and eccentric Cologne breweries all ensure that fun isn't forgotten amidst so much culture. Don't forget the music fair 'Popkomm' with the music festival on the Ring, the largest open-air festival in the world, the 'Cologne marathon' or the brash 'Christopher Street Day'. Easily accessible 'Veedel', the various quarters of Cologne, with their city atmosphere constitute the 'feel-good character' of the town, in which over 70,000 students in eight colleges and universities study.

As an important media centre in Germany, Cologne is home to the largest German radio and



TV broadcasting stations as well as to several private TV channels and film and TV production companies. With a bit of luck, you might come across a film star at a film premiere. Important industrial companies such as Ford, Bayer and the perfume company 4711 are based in the area of Cologne, and the Cologne Congress Centre offers you the chance all year round to attend important international fairs such as Art Cologne.

You can get to Cologne easily and quickly and from all corners of the world via its international airport, by rail or by car. The Rhine, an important and, at the same time, romantic waterway, links the town with North Sea and southwest Germany, France and Switzerland.

The Carl Duisberg Centre in Cologne is close to the city centre and can easily be reached using public transport. It has space for up to 180 students in its friendly classrooms which have all the latest equipment. The media centre with its computers and modern learning programmes, the library and the video library all combine to form a stimulating atmosphere where you can continue learning after your group lessons. You can stay in touch with home and the whole world via satellite TV in the entrance hall and e-mail and Internet access. Our cafeteria or the numerous small restaurants nearby will take good care of your bodily needs in the morning and at lunchtime.



The whole of Munich, a town of art and culture,...



Munich

... a cosmopolitan city and at the same time a village of a million people, forms an architectural work of art. The metropolis with its zest for life charms you mainly with its 'southern flair'. Greek columns, Italian baroque facades and French stucco characterise the historic face of Munich. With 1.3 million inhabitants, Munich is the third largest city in Germany and the capital of Bavaria. The Oktoberfest, the largest public festival in the world, is world famous and takes place every year – but you can find the typical Bavarian 'Gemütlichkeit', or cosiness, in the famous beer gardens and pubs throughout the whole year.

There are countless reasons for a visit to Munich. About 40 theatres put on national and international productions. Over 50 museums are home to world-famous collections of old and modern art. The German Museum is the largest technical museum in the world. You can watch the latest film and TV productions in the Bavaria Film Studios. Besides all this, Munich is also the headquarters of world-renowned companies such as BMW and Siemens and an important centre of IT and biochemistry.

Two universities, the music college and further academies with altogether over 100,000 students live up the town and provide, of course, a thriving sub-culture of pubs, bars and loads of



festivals. Many parks such as the Olympia Park and the English Garden make Munich a green city. Sport and leisure are of great importance here in the town as well as in the attractive surrounding area with its fascinating natural landscape, mountains, lakes, palaces and castles. It even takes less than an hour to get to the nearby Alps.

The Carl Duisberg Centre in Munich is in the quiet residential area of Neuhausen, only four tram stops away from the city centre and the main railway station and a few minutes away by bus or underground train from the student quarter of Schwabing. With about 100 student places and its well-equipped, modern media centre, it offers a pleasant atmosphere for intensive study and making new friends. CDC's own student residential centre is right next to the school. This is where you'll live together with other students from many different countries in your own comfortable single room. Each floor has a shared kitchen and common room where you can cook your meals and chat about your experiences.

At the CDC Centre, you'll find cosy classrooms and a media centre with all the latest equipment where our experienced staff can give you individual help and advice.



Radolfzell, the attractive town on Lake Constance, ...



Radolfzell & Saarbrücken

... is situated very close to Switzerland and the Black Forest. With 27,000 inhabitants it is the smallest CDC teaching centre.

It's not only the fantastic surroundings that make Radolfzell an ideal place for doing a language course and leisure activities of all kinds but also its almost 1,300-year-old history. Numerous historical buildings, picturesque facades of half-timbered houses as well as the modern shopping arcade all tempt you to stroll about. Lake Constance and the magnificent surrounding countryside are ideal for sporting activities: sailing, surfing, swimming, golf, tennis, cycling or just walking are only a few of the many possible activities on offer.



The Carl Duisberg Centre in Radolfzell is right in the middle of the small romantic town. The building houses the administration, the CDC club room, eight classrooms and the media centre. You also have a chance to study by yourself in the language lab, at a computer or in the video room. Besides all this, you also have access to an international telephone, fax machine, e-mail and the Internet. During the breaks, you can get refreshments in our little cafeteria. A well-informed person will also be happy to help you organise leisure activities and answer any questions you may have relating to this topic.

Saarbrücken is a town with many faces – state capital, university town, economic centre and conference centre. Saarbrücken is the place where three countries meet – Germany, Luxembourg and France – it's right at the heart of Europe.

Wherever you go in the town, you'll find architectural evidence of its Franco-German past. Saarbrücken is a very green town with parks and green spaces. With about 200,000 inhabitants, it's one of Germany's smallest cities. You'll find it easy to make friends here. The people here know how to live well – as proved by the pretty little old part of town, the Altstadt, with its numerous pubs and cosy restaurants with cuisine influenced by the French. There's a wide range of activities on offer here which will help make your

stay interesting and varied – such as trips to Heidelberg, Trier, Strasbourg, Paris, Luxembourg or Brussels.



The Carl Duisberg Centre in Saarbrücken, with about 130 places for students, is right in the middle of a green space, only about a ten-minute bus ride away from the town centre. The CDC guesthouse is right next to the school. It has 81 bright, prettily furnished single rooms which all have a desk, telephone, fridge, satellite TV as well as a private bathroom with toilet and shower. If you bring your notebook, you can have access to the Internet via a modem. Every 4 single rooms are grouped together to form a living unit sharing a well-equipped kitchenette with an electric cooker, deep freeze, microwave oven and a place to sit. Besides this, the centre also has its own cafeteria which can offer students full board on days when courses are held. There is free access to e-mails in the reception area.

Dortmund, Hanover & Mannheim

... no-one need ever be bored in Dortmund in the heart of the Westphalia region. A journey through Dortmund's cultural landscape will lead you to many interesting witnesses of the town's exciting history, dating back to AD 880.

A place once dominated by the mining industry, Dortmund today presents a totally different face to the world. Wander through the attractive city centre or visit one of the renowned events in the famous concert hall, the Westfalenhalle, one evening. Or decide between a broad range of cabarets and small shows, international open-air festivals, the opera or the theatre.

Woods, fields and spacious parks cover more than half of the town's area. Cycling, horse-riding, canoeing, fishing and windsurfing are, therefore, just a few of the leisure activities on offer here. The Westphalia Park is a green oasis in the town. Dortmund is the starting point for many diverse excursions to, for example, the cyclists' paradise of 'Munsterland', or to the skiing area of the nearby 'Sauerland' region. Towns which are less than an hour away such as Düsseldorf, Essen or Bochum, with its musical "Starlight Express", are well worth a visit.

The Carl Duisberg Centre is in the town centre, about a ten-minute walk away from the largest shopping street in Dortmund, the Westenhell-

weg. The Centre has places for 90 students and modern classrooms with all the latest equipment. The restaurant, the CD cafeteria, will take care of your bodily needs. The CDC guesthouse is right next to the Carl Duisberg Centre. There are single rooms and well-equipped kitchens available on each floor. The leisure area and the party room in the basement offer you the chance to develop your new-found international friendships.



One-To-One Courses and Mini-Groups in Hanover and Mannheim

These two CDC teaching centres are particularly suited for crash courses in general or specific language – whether in one-to-one lessons or in a mini-group of up to five people.

Hanover, host of Expo 2000, has a wide range of things on offer: the famous Herrenhäuser Gardens, Masch Lake, the old part of town, the Altstadt; and the Guelph Palace. Two important trade fairs take place here every year: CeBit, the computer fair, and the Hanover Fair. There are many destinations in the attractive surrounding area that you can get to easily and quickly such as the Harz Mountains or the heathland as well as the towns of Celle and Hamlin with their pretty half-timbered buildings.

The Carl Duisberg Centre in Hanover has modern classrooms and is in the centre of town. You can book accommodation in all classes of hotels here or you can live with reliable and experienced host families.

Mannheim, the city on the Rhine and Neckar rivers, a centre of industry, trade and transport in Germany, with the largest baroque palace grounds in Germany – now home to Mannheim University. Its close proximity to other historical towns such as Heidelberg, Worms or Speyer also makes it highly attractive.

The Carl Duisberg Centre in Mannheim has 150 places for students in modern classrooms and accommodation in apartments or hotels. Restaurants with which we have made special arrangements provide meals.



Accommodation

Where will you live during your course?

The Carl Duisberg Centren not only take care of your German lessons but they also take care of your accommodation – if you want them to. You can choose between private accommodation with a German host family or in a student hall or residence or an apartment – which is always a single room. Your accommodation is usually available from the Sunday afternoon before the start of your course until the Saturday morning after your course ends.

About 4 weeks before the start of your course, your CDC centre will send you your precise accommodation address and information about your host family or the residence/apartment where you will live.

Private Accommodation

(Host Family) Private accommodation means that you'll live in a single room in a private home. Your host may be either a family with or without children or even just a single person. In either case, this kind of accommodation offers you the best chance to practise your German outside the classroom. Several students may live in the same private accommodation. CDC will try to ensure that you won't share accommodation with students who speak the same native language as you. Depending on the flat or house, you will either have your own bathroom and toilet or you may have to share them with other people in the place. The flats may be in the centre of town or in the outlying districts or suburbs. Travelling time to the CDC centre using public transport can take anything up to 60 minutes.

Student Residence/

Apartment In Munich, Dortmund and Saarbrücken, you'll live in CDC's own residences which are right next to the CDC centres. In other teaching centres, CDC has rented single rooms in student residences or apartment buildings. We have split them into 3 categories, depending on how they're furnished:

A **Guesthouse** means that you'll live in simple, functionally equipped single rooms. There are shared showers, toilets and cooking facilities on each floor. This type of accommodation is on offer in, for example, Berlin, Cologne and Munich.

If you choose an **Apartment**, then you'll have a single room with your own shower or bath and toilet as well as private cooking facilities in your own room. This category is available in, for example, Cologne.

Flats in the category **Apartment Plus** have – besides their own shower/bath and cooking facilities – their own telephone/PC connection



and a TV, some of them with cable or satellite TV reception. As a rule, telephone charges are not included in the rental price.

All forms of accommodation include bed linen, at least one weekly cleaning session as well as a final cleaning session in the rent. As a rule, you can make use of the washing machines for an extra charge. Cooking facilities will include also crockery and cutlery, glasses and cooking utensils.

Meals If you choose to stay with a host family, you can choose between no meals, bed and breakfast or half-board. In many host families and guesthouses and apartments, you'll also be able to make snacks for yourself.

If you book private accommodation with breakfast or half-board, you will usually eat together with other members of the family or other guests. Half board includes breakfast and evening meal. In this case, your host will expect you to fit in with their usual meal times which may be different to those you are used to. You may also eat things different to what you are used to at home. The host families will serve you the kind of meals that Germans usually eat. This is also all part of the experience of everyday German life.



What exams and certificates does CDC offer?



Tests, Certificates & Addresses

End-Of-Course Test: After every 4-week course, you'll take a test to see how much progress you've made. At the end of the course you'll get a certificate documenting your level of achievement.

Carl Duisberg German Diploma

After completing levels 4, 6, 8 or 10, you can do an additional test to get the Carl Duisberg German Diploma (elementary, intermediate I or II or advanced levels). Let your CDC centre know if you want to take this test. The level you're expected to achieve in the CDC German Diploma is in line with the level of achievement of the CDC course system and the levels of the Common European Framework, a general European reference framework for language examinations. This means that your level of achievement will be internationally understood and recognised.

WiDaF With this test of German as a Foreign Language for Business, you can prove your skills in the field of business German. Your general language skills should be at intermediate level at least and you should have knowledge of business German. The test takes place at fixed times during the year and is, on demand, also available at the CDC centres.

Business German

International Exam This internationally acknowledged exam requires good general and specific knowledge at intermediate level. It is held at some CDC centres at several times of the year. The exam was developed by the Carl Duisberg Centren together with the German

Chamber of Commerce and Industry and the Goethe Institut and is carried out by these three institutions throughout the world. It is particularly acknowledged by companies and administrations all over the world.



TestDaF Foreign students have to demonstrate that their German is very good before they are allowed to study at a German university. They can do this by taking either the DSH (German language exam for foreign applicants to German universities) or the new exam TestDaF, which the Carl Duisberg Centren helped to develop. TestDaF can be taken at the CDC centres on the official exam days. Please ask for further information on our offers if you wish to take part in a course at a CDC centre to prepare you for this exam.

How can you enrol?

You can enrol in writing (either by fax or letter) or online. Please fill in the CDC registration form and send it to the CDC centre you would like

to do your course in. If you're not sure which centre is best for you, then send your registration to the CDC customer advisory centre in Cologne. We'll be happy to advise you. By completing the registration form, you accept our conditions as found on the CDC homepage or in the current price list. Any bookings for minors are only valid with an accompanying signature from a parent or legal guardian.

Arrival and Departure/Transfer CDC is not responsible for organising your journey to the centre or back home. All CDC centres will, however, pick you up from the nearest airport or train station and take you to your accommodation if you wish.

Passport and Visa Arrangements Please observe German conditions governing entry into the country. Citizens of EU states do not need a visa to enter Germany. Those from many other, non-EU states may also be permitted to enter the country for up to three months without a visa or with a tourist visa. The German embassy or a German consulate in your home country will be pleased to help you with your enquiries as to whether you need a visa for your language course.
